Thank you for the introduction in your newsletter and we hope to meet some of our neighbours in the area soon!!!



All Residents and Their Guests

Nothing compares to the wonder of horses and dogs **except** when they don't belong together. This applies to everywhere on our ranch and particularly the pond pasture and roads. Shepherd or herding dog breeds have a strong and natural instinct to chase livestock.

Most of us know that horses are prey animals which means they are afraid unless they are not. The "not" comes from patient building of trust between horse and rider. Horses are still afraid of everything else which is why they prefer to be in a herd. You will often notice one horse in the herd is on lookout just in case...

Horses learn to trust dogs through positive interactions. A negative encounter between horse and dog can "spook" a horse and ultimately endanger the rider. Let's face it - all of the riders here are not getting any younger!!! A horse frightened by a dog can result in serious injury.

We all share these magical acres so let's look out for each other's safety. Here's how:

- -don't let your dog offleash in the pond pasture unless the pup has mastered Recall and will not bark at horse/ rider.
- -if your dog is onleash don't get close to horse/rider in the pond pasture or on the road if there is any chance your dog might bark or lunge at the horse.
- -visiting dogs from the city will find interacting with horses very exciting. Dogs that are well behaved at home may run up to horses, barking. Please make sure your guests understand the danger their dogs represent to riders.
- -please do not assume that, because your dog has met a horse, all will be fine the next time they meet.
- -some horses already do not like dogs so just be cognizant of that when walking through pastures.

DID YOU KNOW????

The Ranch Club has a Spot Device for staff that can be loaned out to community members when not in use by staff.

What is a Spot Device?

"SPOT determines your GPS location and sends your location and programmed message to communication satellites. ... Your location and messages are delivered according to your instructions via email, text message, or emergency notification to the GEOS International Emergency Response Coordination Center."

If you are going out into K country or even venturing into the West Pasture by yourself, it is a good idea to take some precautions. The Ranch Club Spot can be found in the feed room in the barn.

There will be a sign out sheet that we ask you to use when taking it and ensure you return it to the barn as it is imperative that it is available to staff when they are out and about working alone. Currently the settings are to send emails and text messages from the help button to Kym Penner, Lori Collins and the Office, along with the 911 being routed directly to the emergency response center for dispatch. Simply turn it on - remember it should always be attached to you, so it does not get lost and you have easy access.



If you are interested in buying your own unit they can be purchased from Amazon or any sporting goods store. The most popular brands are Spot and InReach from Garmin. You buy the unit and then it is a subscription service.

Always a good idea to let a neighbour know if you are going out alone as well!

An Update on one of Square Butte's own: Erin Creegan-Dougherty

Most of you will already know Erin; she has resided at Square Butte Ranch for about 3 years, and has been a Ranchhand assisting with the care of our equine friends for 2 years. She is one of Melodie Creegan's daughters, a student at the Mount Royal University majoring in International business and is now the sole proprietor of

Maskwa Backcountry Foods! Maskwa is Cree for Bear and is a reflection of Erin's Metis heritage.

Through the Entrepreneur and Innovation Institute at Mount Royal University, Erin has recently applied for and been awarded two grants. The first was for "seed funding" through the Founders Fund, which supports student founders in early validation by removing financial barriers to these activities. The second resulted from her entry into the JMH Launchpad Pitch Competition that supports student Entrepreneurs in their business startups.

Erin has a passion for cooking and nutrition. Some time ago she began providing food for backcountry guiding operations, both foods for at the camp and on the trail. Requests received through the guides and their clients alerted Erin to the need to accommodate individual dietary restrictions which included gluten free, paleo, keto and vegan options. Erin experimented with recipes and all of the food she prepares is influenced by both her Indigenous roots and her focus on farm to table options. Grant funding received to date will go towards a Freeze dryer and additional dehydrators (she already has two) and further recipe development.

Erin has another year to complete in her degree. Beyond food production to meet the needs of the Backcountry guiding operations that rely on her, she is also focused on the packaging of her products, e-commerce development, ingredient partnerships and as always ongoing recipe development and improvement. Little wonder that Erin is one of our main expert "go tos" on the dietary needs of our metabolic horses.

Harrowing the pasture helps to break up manure and evenly distributes the nutrients in the manure. Breaking apart the manure piles prevents grass from being smothered. Also, the added benefit is the pastures look so much better when harrowed after a long winter!

This month you will continue to see myself along with Erin and maybe even Louis doing our best to get all the harrowing done as weather permits.

Springtime also means daily checks on the Electric Fences, moving horses, and of course hauling water to the different pastures. If you know of anybody looking for a space for a Ukrainian family then we would would like to offer our house.


We are right now on our way to Marrakech in Morocco after being on horses for a week - a great experience but we are a little sore!

The First Aid Cabinet for People and Equine is pretty much complete at the front door of the Barn. The Tack room has been fully painted and is just waiting for some shelves. Thank you to Hazel Sangster and Kym Penner for the painting and Staining work! New Feed Bins are being constructed that will have a shelf and a lid allowing for more storage for Lori and just a cleaner less cluttered look. With the building that has been happening there are some cut offs of wood that we cannot use. If you are in need of some smaller cut offs please head down to the Barn. The wood that is on the outside of the stall with feed in it is free for the taking. Attached is a picture of the current scrap wood pile.



OPERATIONS

After a slow start, spring is arriving out at Square Butte.

The saloon repairs are coming along, and the building is sealed up at the roof line again. Some internal work still needs to happen, but hopefully that won't take much longer.

We are finalizing our spring grass cutting plan and are engaging with townhome owners to ensure that their green space is manicured to their liking. This may require bringing in a dedicated cutter on an as needed basis, but that will be worked out over time here.

Graveling Chinook Ridge is also underway again and that road is looking great. While all other ranch roads are being inspected and will be repaired as required.
