OPERATIONS

- Heavy accumulations of snowfall have increased attention to plowing and snow removal operations. Road gravelling work has also continued with the warming during the day and cooling at night.
- Water consumption at the Ranch remains higher than what the well is producing. The result is that from time to time water delivery is required. Clay is working closely with Foothills County staff to ensure we keep the plant operational.
- A new UV Lighting system has been approved & ordered to replace the old & obsolete system in the treatment plant.
- Aaron Drilling is scheduled to do a chemical treatment on our well. They will then pull the existing pump, treat with an acid wash & circulate for 24hrs. After the treatment, they will flush the well, reinstall the pump and then start up & test.
- New water meter installations are still ongoing and will be completed as a plumber is available. 30 have been installed at this time
- Burning in the West Pasture went according to schedule and the task is complete.
- Operations has initiated planning meetings to review and schedule work projects ahead.

Firstly, on April 28th The Ranch Club would like to thank Maureen Heffring for arranging for her friend Maureen Enns to come to the Ranch and do a "Living with wildlife" talk in the Saloon. Maureen Enns on her horse Chico Canadian Artist Resident of Alberta Canada Maureen Enns is an internationally celebrated investigative artist/photographer and co-author of the national best-selling books, Grizzly Heart and "Grizzly Seasons" and most recently Wild Horses, Wild Wolves at the foot of the Canadian Rockies. She is well known for her groundbreaking research with Charlie Russell concerning human co-existence with grizzly bears in Russia's Far East. Her focus was on the emotions of bears and the body language bears use with each other to avoid conflict which can be copied by humans.

She has 2 post graduate degrees and 20 years of teaching experience at the Alberta College of Art & Design where she was a leader in innovative learning practices. Maureen has garnered numerous national and international awards in the visual arts and writing which include those from the Alberta Foundation for the Arts, Calgary Region Arts Foundation and the Canada Council Through the Eyes of the Bear, a multimedia art exhibition opened the new Art Gallery of Calgary in 2000 and continued on Slovenia, Paris, France; and the Moscow Contemporary Art Centre, Russia (sponsored by the Canadian Embassy in Moscow).

Monarchas Maripiosas was exhibited in Calgary at Masters Gallery in 2010 following a photographic expedition into the Sierra Madre of Mihoacan in Mexico. Her drawings brought attention to the slow decline of the Monarchs due to the spraying of pesticides throughout the USA on the milkweed.

She has been the subject of 2 CBC TV documentaries; Games End, 1990; Grizzly Kingdom, 1993. She and former research partner, Charlie Russell, were the subject of the documentary Walking with Giants; according to PBS, the most popular documentary produced on human/animal interaction. Pyramid Productions Inc., Calgary, produced a documentary based on Maureen's study and art about the wild horses of the Alberta Ghost Forest, titled, Wild Horses of the Canadian Rockies, released on Animal Planet in August 2008. Her understanding of the body language of bears to avoid conflict was pivotal in unraveling the relationship between a wild horse herd and a wolf pack. In 2018 she exhibited in Zipolite, Oaxaca, Mexico A Naked Plastic Sea, focusing on turtles and sea birds that become entangled in six-pack plastic rings floating in the sea.



Introduction to Piper



I first met Piper back in 2016, when she arrived at my lesson barn. She came with her baby in tow. They'd been sold together by an old-order Mennonite farmer at an auction, but the woman who bought them was really only interested in the foal, so as soon as it was weaned, she put Piper up for sale.

She didn't know Piper's breed or age or even whether she'd ever been under saddle. She'd had a DNA test done, and it suggested that Piper was Trakehner and Appendix. Those tests aren't always entirely accurate, but based on Piper's 'thoroughbreddy' appearance, the results seemed about right. Piper had been sold as a 12-year old, but the vet said that based on her teeth, she was likely a couple of years older than that. And while Piper was okay with being ridden, she was certainly completely green.

I wasn't planning on getting a horse when I joined that lesson barn - just on getting back into riding in a casual way after more than 20 years out of the saddle. And I certainly wasn't planning on getting an untrained mystery mare from an auction. But I thought Piper was beautiful and very sweet, and on an impulse, I bought her.

My lesson barn was a dressage barn, so dressage is what we did, in a casual way. We never showed, but if we had done, it would have been at training level at best. Piper and I were both happy enough just hanging out and puttering around, and that's how we've spent our last six years together.

Piper's been here at Square Butte since early January. and she's slowly settling in. But there sure are a lot of changes for her to get used to! At her old barn, she was stalled overnight and turned out during daylight hours only. Here she's out 24/7. At her old barn, there was an indoor arena where we rode three or four times a week, year-round. Here, the lack of indoor facilities means Piper's been on an extended winter vacation. At her old barn, there were no moose, and those things are terrifying! But all in all, Piper's quite happy with her new feral lifestyle. Maybe a little too happy, in fact.

For now, Piper's in with the old-timers, but will be joining the mares once they go to their summer pasture. I do hope to introduce her to trail-riding this summer, but we'll be starting slowly. If you see us hand-walking around the ranch once the ice melts, give us a wave. But not a big one. Piper's a bit spooky still.
