

BIRDERS CORNER - Sandy Almberg



CANADA JAY - The deceptively cute Canada Jay is one of the most fearless birds in North America, living in northern forests year-round and rearing chicks in the dark of winter. Better known as Whisky Jacks, or Grey Jays, these highly curious birds are always on the lookout for food. Canada Jays eat just about anything, from berries to small animals. They may even land on your hand to grab a raisin or peanut. During summer they hoard food in trees to sustain themselves through bleak winters.

STELLER'S JAY – A darker cousin to the Bluejay, the Steller's Jay can easily be identified by his black hood and dark blue feathers. Although slightly larger than Bluejay, Steller's Jays do not have any light grey or white feathering. According to mythology, sighting a Steller's Jay is "the message of hope in disrepair and the will to live. The Jay is willing to teach you fearlessness, adaptability and survival but you must be willing to follow his lead". Steller's Jays are common in higher altitude forested regions from Alaska to northern Nicaraqua.

BOBCATS AND COUGARS - Sylvia Lambert and Nancy Barrett

FROM SYVIA LAMBERT: Bobcats

I have seen one run in the condo pasture years ago and I also heard reports from other people at the same time that they had seen one as well. I see no reason why they wouldn't frequent that area. I had one on my fence in Calgary about 3-4 weeks ago. They are known to live in Oakridge and other communities.

BOBCATS are distinguishable by their black tufted ears, dark markings, and of course their short "bobbed" tails. These felines can be found in southern Alberta, and range over a variety of different habitats such as riparian woodlands, coniferous forests, broadleaf forests, swamps, and even suburban areas.

FROM NANCY BARRETT: Cougars have been spotted at our ranch

Cougars are considered large cats, with bodies 5 to 6 feet in length including their long tails. These cats average about 135 pounds and can weigh up to 180 pounds. Bobcats are mid-sized cats measuring just 2 to 3.5 feet long and weighing up to 40 pounds.

PLEASE GIVE ME SPACE. Just like your house cat, bobcats will likely ignore your presence. But, they are wild animals! Observe and appreciate bobcats from a distance.

I'M NOT A FAN OF DOGS. Dogs can stress or harm bobcats. Cats (and very small dogs) on the other hand, may look like a bobcat meal. Keep dogs on leash and cats indoors.

ENJOY YOUR CITY PARKS! Please stay on trails and respect park closures. Uving in a big city can leave you itching for more space. Stepping off trails and entering parks after hours even further reduces space available for animals.

SUPPORT CITY EFFORTS TO MAINTAIN NATURE. To continue to see a thriving urban biodiversity, including bobcats, we need to ensure animals can move around the city – this means we need to protect existing green spaces, create new ones, and invest in development that is more animal-friendly.



Cougar Identification



The pelage, or coat of adult cougan, is uniformly colored tawny, grey-brown, or red-brown.

> Characteristic black "mustache" and long

shiskers.

Thick, long, black-tipped tail.

The tail measures about one-third of the cougar's body length and serves to counter-balance the cougar's movements as it pursues prey and travels across the landscape.


The coats of kittens have blackish-brown spots. Spots begin to fade to dapples at

Spots begin to fade to dapples at about 12 to 14 weeks, and disappear completely in about 18 months.

Appearance


The cougar is the second largest member of the cat family in the western hemisphere (the jaguar is the largest) and the largest of the North American wild cats. On average, adult male cougars stand about 30 inches at the shoulders, are about 7 to 8 feet long from nose to the tip of their tail (the tail is about 1/3 of that length), and weigh about 120 to 160 pounds. Large males can reach up to 180 pounds but that is very uncommon. Adult female cougars are usually about 25% smaller than male cougars (about 85 to 110 pounds).

Cougars can be identified by two primary characteristics: the pelage or coat of adult cougars is uniformly colored tawny, grey-brown or red-brown, and a very thick and long black-tipped tail which measures about half of their body length. The tail serves to counter-balance the cougar's movements as they pursue prey and travel across the landscape.

I did not know a horse could instil patience in you.


I did not know a horse could make you listen better.

- Do you think your household would book more than once this summer if available?


- Would you be interested in taking horses out alone on Square Butte property?




Horse Owners!



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

From Community Book "Our Foothills" 1880s - 1940s



The old **<u>Rancher's Hall</u>** in Millarville was built in 1895. It consisted of a log building with a wooden stove in the middle to heat the coffee. There were outside benches, lots of dances and the kids joined in at the dances where they eventually fell asleep while the grownups danced all night.

Christ Church was built in the 1900s on donated land and the furniture came from Europe. Before there was a church, the homesteaders would have church service in someone's home. The original church served all faiths as the centre of a large community in an area with few churches. The congregation huddled around a wood burning heater at the back of the church for a brief 20 minute service on bitterly cold days. Fortunately there was a wind proof shelter for parishioners' horses. The "Calf Program" in the early 1950s was created to help the parish budget. Up to 36 calves with the Church brand went to willing ranchers to prepare for shipment with proceeds going to the church.

Susie has only staged one breakout since moving to Square Butte and that was to follow Lori C. to the barn on farrier day, however residents should keep an eye out for the beautiful paint mare with the blue eye as you never know when she will find an opportunity to go for a stroll.

OPERATIONS - Grant Kelba

The saloon is being rebuilt and the insurance company has brought in the appropriate contractors to ensure it will be better than new when it's all said and done. There is no timeline on when it will be finished as the supply of materials is erratic and although much is on site, other materials have not yet arrived and are holding up the process. The wall that separated from the building is now repaired and reattached. Once it's sealed at the top the tarps will come off and the inside work will continue.

The first priority this spring is to get our fencing fixed as much of it was crushed during the windstorm. The due diligence around who will do it is still being resolved and a decision will be made shortly once further discussions with the selected contractors occur. We will be starting to fix perimeter fences in the coming weeks so we can once again use all our pastures for the horses.

We have built a list of repairing and cleaning various areas and venues and entitled it "Ranch Beautification". So hopefully you will be seeing the changes magically appear before your eyes. Included is repairing the roof on the recycling shed that blew off <u>on</u> <u>December 1st.</u> The materials have been ordered and we simply need to sit and wait for our order to be fulfilled on that project. Other items in our bucket list include signs that need to be rehung, trails that need to be cleaned up, gardens will be weeded, and roadways will be graveled. Just to name a few of what's ahead for us.

Also happening this spring will be the next phase of townhome painting. True to form, deciding on which building is next came down to a scientific and strategic decision. (heads or tails) The official coin toss was held on Friday, March 11th with representatives of the two remaining townhome blocks present, with Yvonne Gaudet acting as the official coin tosser. The whole thing was videotaped by Lori Young and uploaded onto the resident Facebook page in order to prove its validity. The winners are units 53-56 with that project scheduled to start in May, providing the weather will permit it.

Once again, thank you for using water wisely. NO additional water has been trucked in since early January.

For all of us but ESPECIALLY NEW OWNERS MOVING IN

We have two large bins for disposing of garbage and cardboard in the exterior enclosure, next to the recycling building.

To ensure we efficiently use these bins please heed the following instructions.

Cardboard Boxes

The container with the horizontal slot is to be used for disposal of cardboard. You must "deconstruct" the boxes.

-tear apart/cut-up/rip-up-in pieces that will fit through the slot.

All boxes must be handled in this manner to reduce cubage and reduce our disposal costs.

Garbage

The larger steel container in the outside enclosure is to be used for Plastic bagged garbage secured by a twist tie or knot.

- No cardboard boxes, empty or full of garbage are to go in this container.
- Again, this will reduce curbage costs for everyone. <u>Please ensure</u> <u>all garbage is contained and the lid is closed to prevent</u> <u>animals from getting into garbage.</u>

Recyclables

Plastic (flattened if possible), flattened tin cans, paper/magazine/flyers and non-cardboard containers are to go into the **black plastic** containers in the **"garbage building".**

Making these items as small as possible will reduce curbage costs.

Bottle Depot Recycling for Refund \$\$

Finally, **the large plastic barrel** just inside the door to your left in the **"garbage building"** is the place to deposit your refundable containers. Preference is for just containers in the plastic barrel, so please try to avoid putting refundables in boxes or plastic bags. Please do not put other recyclable material in this container as they should go in the **black plastic bins**.

The proceeds from the "refundables" goes to the Square Butte Ranch Events Committee.

Thank you for helping to prepare and dispose of your refuse in the proper receptacles. This will reduce costs for this service.


Foothills Landfill and Recycling Centre for Large items:

You will need to declare your address as Millarville in order to use the land fill. There is a fee.
